Themes

Flower Shop

April showers bring May flowers! Children will have fun learning about all kinds of flowers and ways to care for them. Create a pretend flower shop and explore simple gardening. Children will also learn about pollination during this theme.

Animals All Around

Big and small, short and tall, scaly and furry—children will love stories, rhymes, and more featuring all kinds of animals. They can explore with their whole bodies as they imitate animal sounds and movements. Domestic and wild animals are covered.


Animal Sort

Recipe

Watermelon Pizza

medium-sized watermelon vanilla yogurt fruity toppings (grapes, kiwis, bananas, etc.) crunchy toppings (toasted almonds, coconut flakes, etc.)



Cut your fruity pizza toppings ahead of time. Then, cut the watermelon into slices. Choose one slice of watermelon; this will be your "pizza crust." Spread vanilla yogurt onto the watermelon. Now, invite your child to help you add any desired fruity toppings to the watermelon. Give the watermelon pizza a final touch by adding crunchy toppings. Cut the watermelon pizza into smaller triangle pieces as needed. Enjoy the cold fruity treat on a hot summer day!
